ouses of Hope offers three levels of service to address the needs of men and women whose lives have been impacted by substance use and mental health issues. Our programs allow for treatment that is individualized and offer a variety of ways to tackle recovery in a fully personalized way, making a big difference in each life.

Houses of Hope is known for our halfway houses, but we are much more than just one program. Our three programs reach men and women throughout our community, addressing substance use and mental health issues, as well as offering a chance for a new life for individuals in recovery. Houses of Hope offers the chance to change, live a healthy life, and do so with the clinical and social supports so clearly needed during these challenging times.

For over 50 years, Houses of Hope has been proud of our mission to provide affordable residential treatment and support service for individuals in recovery from substance abuse.

Our Programs

Touchstone is a 20-bed, short-term residential substance use treatment program, serving men and women over the age of 19, who have a severe drug or alcohol dependence diagnosis. We serve roughly 200 individuals a year, working closely with outside providers. Please visit Touchstone's new website - touchstonelincoln.org.

Halfway House is a 36-bed transitional residential substance use treatment program for adult males. In the program, clients continue to address their substance use and begin their journey in recovery in a supportive, safe, alcohol/drug free environment. Individuals practice life skills, gain employment, build healthy discipline into daily

routines, and as they transition from the program, they are firmly rooted in recovery and able to live independently and productively in the community.

TASC - (Intensive Case Management & Emergency/
Crisis Response) includes Intensive Community Services,
Emergency, Recovery Support and Crisis Response – which
provide community services in the client's home environment.
TASC works with each individual and his/her support system
to develop service goals that aide in improving overall quality
of life. TASC is a collaboration between Houses of Hope,
Blue Valley Behavioral Health, Lutheran Family Services and
the Bridge Behavioral Health.



- Served nearly 800 clients in FY 2015-2016.




INCOME BY PROGRAM
